JOE HOY – 25 YEARS



Congratulations to Joe Hoy who became the 91st employee reaching 25-years of service at Greenville Tool & Die on July 1, 2016.

Joe grew up east of Greenville, right on M-57, and began working at 14 years of age mowing lawns. Early in high school Joe decided he wanted to be an electrician. He began taking classes that included: sheet metal, woodworking, auto shop, drafting, machine shop, welding, and of course electrical class. Before starting his junior year of high school in 1989, Joe's uncle, Bill Heether encouraged him to check out the tool & die trade. He was offered a co-op position at Tomco Tool & Die where Uncle Bill worked. It was here where Uncle Bill referred to all the young co-op and apprentices as "boy", Joe got the nick name Hoy Boy.

Upon graduation from Greenville High School in 1991, Joe was offered and accepted an apprenticeship at Tomco Tool & Die. But, just prior to completing his apprenticeship his parents decided to sell their home here in Greenville and move north to the U.P. Having three years done and only one year to go in his apprenticeship, Joe made the hard decision to stay south of the bridge and moved in with the neighbors. Joe lived in the neighbor's basement for about four months until he found and bought a house in Sheridan. He still owns the house today. Joe completed his apprenticeship in June of 1995, soon after took an interest in welding, and purchased his first welder for the garage in 1996. After Joe joined Greenville Tool & Die in 2003 he fine-tuned his welding skills. In addition to Joe's welding skills, he has operated the CNC mills, jig grinders, wire burners, and built dies.

Joe has a daughter, Taylor, who is 13 years of age, and when not spending time with her, Joe is enjoying the out-of-doors, weld fabrication, fishing, hunting, tinkering at home, and helping others.

Joe has been involved in our GTD fundraising committee for many years, helping our charities of Relay for Life, Food Drive, and Toys-4-Tots. From 2013 thru 2015, 3 straight years for the Relay for Life, Joe walked 24 hours straight without stopping. In 2013 he walked 45 miles, 46 miles in 2014, and 50 miles in 2015! It would appear as though the older Joe gets the faster he walks. Also, Joe is an avid supporter of the Red Cross Blood Drive. He has donated 122 units and recently reached 15 gallons of blood donated. Joe has served on the Tomco/GTD first aid team for the entire 25 years of his service. This first aid commitment all began with Joe joining the Crystal Raceway Safety team upon graduation from high school. Joe served on the race track safety team for 10 years.

One last thing about Joe, he is one you can always count on to have candy in his tool box. When asked about the tool & die trade and the changes he has seen, Joe mentioned the engineering and machining technology. He aged himself when he said he could still remember designers drawing on the drawing boards rather than CAD stations.

Greenville Tool & Die thanks Joe for his rock-solid commitment and all the triumphant achievements he has shared with us over the past 25 years, and wish him continued success in his career.

MARV DOEZEMA RETIRES



Congratulations to Jerry Smith who became the 92nd employee reaching 25-years of service at Greenville Tool & Die on October 8, 2016.

Born and raised just east of Belding, Jerry and his family still reside in the same house he grew up in. Included on the property is his dad's pole barn, set up with a machine shop, where Jerry recalls standing on a box to run the lathe. He remembers him and his dad making tractor implements for a 1926 Farmall Regular tractor. This tractor was one of the first with the Farmall name. Jerry still has it today. It has been converted from steel wheels to rubber, and over to hydraulics.




Jerry graduated from Belding High School in 1983, where he took classes such as: welding, metals and machine, and wood shop, also working on a dairy farm in Ionia. After graduation, Jerry continued to work on the dairy farm for about another year and a half, while at the same time taking classes at Montcalm Community College. In 1985, Jerry became employed at IEM in Ionia making and building die components for the tool & die industry. Over a period of five years at IEM, Jerry worked his way up to CNC department manager. In 1990, Jerry received an opportunity to join GTD, which he did. Over the years he worked in die assembly, wire burn, and jig grinding. In July of 1991, Jerry would marry the former Yvonne Rhoades. They have 4 children, Kyle, Sarah, Naomi, and Stephanie. Jerry completed his tool & die apprenticeship and received his journeyman's card in 1994. He commented that he really enjoys the precision machining department.

Jerry also enjoys working at home in that same machine shop he and his dad worked in, cutting wood for home heat, working in his small orchard of fruit trees, and fixing cars. He said he doesn't exactly enjoy the car repairs, but with four kids it is necessary. When asked about the changes he has seen over the years; Jerry said the size of the dies stand out. He remembers building dies with Neil Winters on a gas tank shield and the overall size of the dies were around 4x4x4ft high. That was considered big back then.

On behalf of all of us here at GTD, we thank Jerry for the unwavering dedication and excellent workmanship he has shared with us over the past 25 years, and wish him continued success in his career.
